


The Lay Fraternities of St. Dominic

Twenty-fourth Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 50:5-9a | Jas 2:14-18 | Mk 8:27-35

GROW AS A DISCIPLE | PRAY, STUDY, ENGAGE, SERVE

"Whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross and follow me." Jesus' words in today's Gospel don't leave much room for "secondary interpretation." Deny yourself, take up your cross, and follow Jesus. At first glance this may sound intimidating, but let's think about it in the light of today's readings. By denying ourselves, we are able to turn more fully toward God and toward others. Isn't that what James is asking of us in his letter? He says this of faith: "if it does not have works, [it] is dead." He even uses an example that might sound like something we would hear in a homily today: he asks, if you see someone who doesn't have proper food or clothing and you simply wish them well without offering assistance, what good are you doing?

GO EVANGELIZE

PRAYER, INVITATION, WITNESS, ACCOMPANIMENT

Certainly, when we help and serve others, we are working concretely to build the kingdom of God on earth. We are, quite literally, being Christ's hands and feet in the world and following in our Lord's footsteps. By thinking and acting with this mindset, we are turning toward God; we are seeking to lighten the loads of others – helping them to carry their crosses. In today's Gospel passage, although Peter's words, "You are the Christ" were faith-filled and seemed to imply understanding, he was not able to embrace the fullness of Christ's mission. He rebukes Jesus for "setting himself up" to suffer greatly and be killed. In response, Jesus rebukes Peter and says he is not thinking as God does. As human beings, we know we are not able to think as God does. But we are made in God's image, and the more we love one another, the more we reflect him in what we do.

WITNESS Peter's mistake was thinking he knew better than God how to do what needed to be done. Is there anything in your life that makes you think you might be like Peter? Choose a corporal or spiritual work of mercy, and spend some time listening to God in prayer as to how he might desire you to perform it.

LITURGY AND MINISTRY

Today's Readings:

Today we hear t that is at the center of the entire Gospel. Who is Jesus, and what does it mean to follow him? We would do well to reflect on this question from time to time. Who do we say that Jesus is, and how do our actions demonstrate this belief?

Gospel Focus:

Our lives must demonstrate our belief in Christ.





PRAYER FOR THE SICK

It is a little-known fact that the Catholic Church is largely responsible for what today we call *hospitals*. The Latin word *hospes* means "guest" or "traveler", and it was the work of the Church—from the very beginning—to provide hospitality and charity to those who were in

What was the motivation for Christians to provide healthcare to others? Simply, the words of Jesus: "For I was hungry and you gave me food, I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me, naked and you clothed me, ill and you cared for me, in prison and you visited me" (Matthew 25:35-36).

Many great saints like St. Basil, St. Jerome, and St. Cyprian established hospitals in their areas for care of the sick and suffering. The Council of Nicea (325 A.D.) even ordered that every city which had a cathedral should also have a hospital.

Over time, lay and religious orders formed in the Church that were dedicated exclusively to the care of the sick such as the Knights Hospitallers, the Alexians, some branches of the Benedictines, Franciscans, Carmelites, the Missionaries of Charity, and others.

If we are not a healthcare professional, we may not be able to care for the sick directly, but we can at times visit them as one of the corporal works of mercy, and we can all pray for those who are ill. The Church gives us a simple *Prayer for the Sick* in the following words that we may pray any time we are concerned about the health and wellbeing of another:

Father in heaven, grant N. comfort in his/her suffering. Give him (her) courage when afraid, patience when afflicted, hope when dejected, and when alone, assure him (her) of the prayerful support of your holy people. We ask this through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Since sickness is part of a fallen world and will always be with us, we often need to ask for peace of heart to deal with it. Many times illness is stronger than we are. In times of sickness, problems, or upheaval, we should recall St. Paul's consoling words to the Philippians: "Have no anxiety at all, but in everything, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God. Then the peace of God that surpasses all understanding will guard your hearts and minds in Christ Jesus" (Philippians 4:6-7).
